Issues:


- Increasing population density

What is Valued



Open Space

Open space for pets and their owners, as well as people without pets is important for health and well-being.



Variety of Park Spaces

 A variety of different types of opportunities is desired - there is no one-size-fits-all.

Safety

 Safety is important for both people and pets, including the range of dog personalities.

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Environmental Considerations

 The community values environmental and wildlife protection, as well as having opportunities to connect with and recreate in nature.



Park Cleanliness and Waste Management

The community values park cleanliness, and waste management.

Sense of Community

 Bringing pets to parks and interacting with other community members is important to the sense of community.



Park Equity

- There was agreement that parks should be spaces for all to enjoy and improved balance is needed.

What needs Improvement



Dog Behavior and Lack of Training/Control

 Owners not having control over their offleash dogs.



Environmental Considerations

- Importance of environmental and wildlife protection.
- Concerns with off-leash dogs impacting wildlife, natural areas, and re-naturalized areas in Saanich parks.



Communication and Education

- Bylaws and restrictions are confusing and not well understood.
- Lack of awareness of etiquette related to people and pets in parks.



Increasing Demand

 More people and pets are putting pressure on the parks system and there are unmet needs for places to safely exercise and socialize pets, particularly in high density areas.



Visitor Comfort

 Some community members avoid parks in Saanich due to off-leash dogs being present.

Bylaw Amendment Nov 2023:

Recommendations put Forward from the Strategy

- Definition for 'dogs in control'
- Dogs to be on leash within 10 M of a playground
- On-leash at all beach's except one
- Fenced amenity areas for dogs in 12 parks

Council Deliberations and Changes

- Remaining 43 parks zoned P4 are leash-optional from 6am to 9am daily
- Leash Optional trail extended in one park
- Beaches off-leash except for existing restrictions (seasonal/bird sanctuary)
- Fenced areas for dogs reduced to 5
- No retractable leashes in Saanich
- No dogs in playgrounds

Retractable-leash ban in latest version of Saanich animal bylaw

The ban would come into effect when the new bylaw is adopted in coming weeks

City of Richmond Dog Off-Leash Areas: A Brief History

- Pilot projects
- Capital projects
- City forces vs. external
- Public vs. private
- Broad range of typologies
 - Basic to complex
 - Natural to urban
 - Trails to parks
 - Open areas to enclosures

Dog off-leash pilot program approved

Program approved by Council, **six pilot sites** designated: Hamilton Highway Park, Old Cambie School Field, Shell Road Trail, McDonald Beach, No. 3 Road Dike, McCallan Road ROW

Pilot program expansion, new facilities

Program expanded to **seven designated dog off-leash areas** and **four pilot sites** - new locations include Steveston Park, Garden City Park and South Arm Park

Hot under the collar

Seventeen (give or take) dog off-leash areas, including one pilot project and a temporary facility on a developer site; two public engagement processes resulting from public outcry/petitions

Continued expansion, Dog Park Strategy

Further engagement, dog off-leash area upgrades, two permanent facilities forthcoming; dog off-leash strategy to be incorporated into Parks and Open Space Strategy update
